Comments on significant changes: In late 2014, FRC consolidated with the Union Presbyterian Church (UPC) following a two-year conversation plan. The result was an increase in FRC's membership (+ 75) and a mission endowment fund administered by previous UPC members. This merger was an important accomplishment.

In late 2019, FRC completed a four million dollar renovation of its non-worship space to improve access to existing youth education, social and worship spaces and to create much-needed versatile space for wider community use. The new design increased handicapped accessibility, included green, energy-efficient features and allows for summer worship services in comfort. Our new kitchen is equipped with state-of-the art appliances; the church entrance was upgraded to include a courtyard for outside gatherings and performances. Of late, Covid has restricted full use of these spaces; yet they remain an attractive element to attract members and community groups.

FRC's recently completed renovation project has provided a new area for the church's youth to thrive and grow. However, since COVID, youth numbers have plateaued.

15. Describe briefly all educational programs (including children, young adult, adult).

Youth Education:

Kinderwyk ages: Birth through Pre-k. Child care is provided for the youngest members. Books and projects are offered during the church service.

Young Children in Worship: Kindergarten through 4th grade. Curriculum from the Children in Worship program during the church service.

Dwell: Grades 5 through 8. Curriculum from the Dwell curriculum during the church service.

Pathways: Birth through 5th grade. This program was created due to COVID. Stations have been set up within the church. Stations include: story, music, art activity, gross motor activities, and a snack.

Middle School-High School Youth Group: Meets biweekly with one mission trip opportunity. This is currently being led by parents. Typically the youth group has been on a four year rotation for week-long mission trips. Year one is a local mission opportunity; year two a national mission trip; year three a local mission trip; year four an international mission trip.

Adult Education:

Kerygma Bible Study holds at least two sessions a year of several weeks each and usually two times per day (morning and early evening) to accommodate schedules. It is led by our Associate Pastor.

The Horizons Bible Study usually holds two sessions per year for 8 - 10 weeks, attended by 6 - 10 women. Horizons is a continuation of leadership and participation from former UPC members.

The Breakfast Bible Study Bunch The group was organized by the former senior minister and members of the congregation. Its purpose is to inform and deepen the participants' understanding of bible passages through discussion and reflection.

First Forum is one of the longest running adult education offerings of FRC. It's a mixed group and meets weekly after the service for 45 minutes. Topics range from religion, social justice, and politics, to other community interests.

The Lenten series is a 5-week program with three topics: one biblical and the others focused on current events/timely books. Selections are made by Adult Ed and Nurture Committee and are usually taught by ministers, members of the congregation, or invited experts.

Anti-racism series have been offered in the past few years using a variety of formats including participating in a community-wide study, First Forum, and the Lenten Studies.

Faith-Forming Weekends is an annual retreat-style adult education opportunity that includes a guest speaker who gives a keynote address on Saturday, which is open to the community, and who also gives a sermon on Sunday. A number of small group discussions are also scheduled for church members. Serene Jones, President of Union Theological Seminary was scheduled in 2020 to focus on her book *Call it Grace* but the event was canceled due to the outbreak of the pandemic.

Johnson Library: The library serves the clergy, church committees, church program leaders, and the congregation. The library's holdings contain more than 3,000 books on topics including religion (more than half the titles), philosophy, social sciences, natural sciences, applied sciences, the arts, literature, history, biographies, and fiction. The Johnson Library also supports a monthly Book Club on Zoom.

While Covid put the world in limbo, FRC created a virtual space for people to navigate the fear, confusion, and isolation of the pandemic. We did so by building on our existing online presence. We began to live-stream all services and Jazz Vespers. We adopted Zoom for post service coffee hour fellowship, First Forum, Consistory meetings, committee meetings and other services such as baptisms and memorial services. Our original technical capacity was not adequate though to address demand and as a result we are making a significant increase in technology to enhance the online viewing experience. We strive to keep growing our online presence.

39. Describe the community and school system:

First Reformed Church of Schenectady is located in the heart of the NY State and nationally registered Stockade Historic District on the banks of the Mohawk River.

Schenectady was first settled by Dutch entrepreneurs in 1661. They brought Schenectady's first church, the Dutch Reformed Church, with them. The Church's earliest records were lost but remaining records continue from 1680. For this reason, 1680 is used as the church's founding date."First Reformed Church" became the church's official name in 1867.

Schenectady's First Reformed Church played a role in starting 17 other Reformed churches in the region. Schenectady's most important figures made the Stockade their homes in the 17th, 18th, and 19th centuries. Today the Stockade District is one of the oldest and best preserved neighborhoods in the United States. Homes in the Stockade are examples of nearly every architectural type, period, and style dating from approximately 1690 to 1930.

Schenectady is home to General Electric, Union College, SUNY Schenectady County Community College, Ellis Medicine, and Proctors Theater. Additionally, various quality health care, museums, and restaurants are available.

Over the years Proctors has expanded to host some of the most popular Broadway shows. Over the last ten years, downtown Schenectady has added the Rivers Casino, luxury apartments, new restaurants, and a thriving nightlife. Also, upgrades continue to SUNY Schenectady County Community College, city parks, and the train and bus stations.

The City of Schenectady is located in Schenectady County. Other nearby communities include Rotterdam, Glenville, Scotia, and Niskayuna. School districts in the area include Schenectady City, Rotterdam-Mohonasen, Schalmont, Scotia-Glenville, Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake, and Niskayuna. Schenectady City is the largest school district with 18 schools and approximately 9,750 students. The Schenectady City schools have more socioeconomic and racial diversity than the suburban schools. The other school districts have a student population of between 2,000 and 4,500 students.

Schenectady is near Troy and Albany, forming what is locally called the "Capital Region." Saratoga Springs is a short drive north and is also rich with history, beauty, the arts, and horse racing. The Saratoga Performing Arts Center (SPAC) is the summer home to the NYC Ballet and the Philadelphia Orchestra as well as numerous concerts and events. New York City, Montreal, and Boston are all within a few hours drive. The Adirondack and Catskill Mountains are a short drive depending on which area you plan to visit. The Berkshires in Massachusetts, the Green Mountains in Vermont, and the White Mountains in New Hampshire are also easily accessible. Skiing can be found a short distance at resorts such as Killington, Stratton, Whiteface, Mount Snow, and Okemo.

In short, being part of the Capital District with close proximity to wilderness areas, rich historic sites, and major metropolitan areas makes Schenectady an attractive place to live and work.

- Maintain mission and benevolence support.
- Strengthen internal community through fellowship.
- Increase our online and social media presence to connect with new people and make sure our members know about the important and ongoing work of the church.

We want to accomplish this ideal with not only monetary gifts but also with our physical and supportive presence. We also hope to grow the congregation over the next 5 years. We are a church positioned for growth.

We also strive to continue to fulfill FRC's Covenant's promise, both within the congregation and the greater community.

9) Explain whatever else you would like your potential pastor to know about your church.

FRC is composed of people with differing opinions yet still we manage to work together for a common purpose. For example, a long discussion and lots of debate ensued before we decided to expand and renovate our facility. However, once the project was approved and underway, the congregation invested hundreds of volunteer hours to ensure the project's success.
